

Robert Residence

We see signs around the neighborhood saying "Home is where the heart is." But home is also where the history is. The OHNA is working to preserve the history of houses and families in our neighborhood. What's your house's history?

Here's my very ordinary story: Our house was built in 1963 on the corner of Saturn Springs and Glenbrook Drive, by the newly constructed bridge across the creek. We moved in March 1972. People with long memories say, "I remember playing with the Duke girls" and "Oh, you live in the Duke's house." Oh, come on - we have lived in the house 45 years, 7 months, surely it can be called the Roberts' house.

Our four children grew up playing in the creek behind the house sometimes called Saturn Springs Creek, Axe Creek, Duck Creek 2 and Duck Creek. When one son was 10 he stepped on a rusty nail, developed strep and stayed in the hospital 5 days. Another time, the same son and friends hung off the bridge to capture a john boat in flood waters. Once during a wonderful snow and ice storm, we were up early sliding down the hill on cookie sheets and turkey roasting pans. The most fun was five or six going down the hill on a metal step ladder. Our neighbor raised her window and hollered at us, "You crazy people it's four o'clock" (that was AM). Then, they came out and joined us.



It is an amazing fact that all four kids did grow up. And all the neighbor kids did too. At one time there were 14 boys between the ages of 9 and 12 from our corner to Old Orchard - all on their bicycles, skateboards and skates. Once we applied to build a storage building in our back yard but were turned down because we were in a floodplain. Yes, we are in two floodplains. Since we could not construct a permanent building, ours is on skids in case we need to move it. I might mention it is now 8 feet closer to the bank than when constructed. No, we have not moved it closer to the creek; the creek has moved closer to us. One year we had a winter storm during Christmas and no electricity for four days over January 1. We lit the gas in the fireplace and camped in the den. Some of our kids' friends came because they thought that was such fun. We had solid sleeping bags on the floor, put all food outside on the patio and cooked in the fireplace, lived like pioneers. Fortunately, we still had water. See - you have stories to tell. No famous people lived in our house; we've never been on the evening news, nor have we done major changes to our house. Some of you have done all of those. Tell us about it.

At the 2017 Neighborhood Summit, residents from Garland, Plano and surrounding communities gathered to share ideas and learn how community leaders are actively engaging and strengthening their communities. For the first time in 15 years, the Neighborhood Summit was hosted by the City of Plano, at the Oak Point Nature Center.

Sponsored by the Office of Neighborhood Vitality, the event was held November 4th at Oak Point Park Nature and Retreat Center. The event's general session and six additional breakout sessions were very good, but the Center alone was worth the trip.

We learned how to help reactivate failing neighborhoods, how to use Next Door for other uses than finding lost pets (who knew?), how to build cooperation in neighborhoods, and how to interview people to preserve the history of buildings and families.

The views from the windows, the parking lot and the deck were beautiful. We saw people on bicycles, on horses, people walking, birds flying, ducks landing on the lake. To get there, go up Jupiter, past Collin College about a mile. Park and enjoy the beauty then go in the building and enjoy the beauty, a very nice building.

Now back to the Summit. Orchard Hills was well represented: Charlie, Eula, Margi, Jan and I have valuable information to share with you. I think our favorite person was Emma from Rainbow Estates. This is a very small area north of 66, behind a very large Mount Hebron Church.

On Friday night, a mixer was held at the Atrium. We met and talked to city leaders and people from other neighborhoods who work so their area will have a positive impact. These are doers in their community: organizing neighborhood associations and crime watches, serving on boards, doing landscaping, applying for grants. I guess we can say these are

people who put their money where their mouth is. I have attended 12 of the 15 Summits. I have heard speakers from Minneapolis, Pittsburgh, Denver, Houston, Ft. Worth, Dallas and many other places. They all have common experiences: this is what we faced, this is how we confronted it. Not all were great success stories, some were small steps but all were dedicated to making a difference. The workshops and mini sessions give people a chance to work together, ask questions, do problem solving. I like attending the Summits. I like the people I meet. I like talking to people who want good things to happen in their neighborhoods and who are doing what they can. Every year we have our own summit at the annual meeting. We encourage people to come meet each other, city leaders, city employees. This will be at the Lutheran Church on Saturn in April. We have a mini summit every second Monday each month. All of you are invited to attend the business meetings, hear what is going on, make suggestions. Come to the back door by the playground at Saturn Road Church of Christ. Both churches are very generous in letting us use their buildings.


OHNA Celebrates
