On Thursday, April 18th, the Orchard Hills Neighborhood Association gathered for the 19th Annual Meeting at the First Sagrada Familia Lutheran Church. Surrounded by garden themed decorations, we gathered for a casual meal followed by the meeting which began with the posting of the American Flag and the Pledge of Allegiance led by Bill Sisk, a veteran of The Korean Conflict. Crime Watch

Officer Mike Pesta provided a Crime Watch update where he happily reported that following the last annual meeting, no criminal activity occurred for eight months. Since December, there has been 13 car break-ins, over half of the vehicles were unlocked. The biggest takeaway is to first reach out to Officer Pesta with concerns and to dial 911 for criminal activities instead of solely posting on Next Door. Neighbors were reminded to enroll in the Citizens on Patrol program, which is a four-hour training class and to also let the Garland Police Department know if you have a security camera so that it could be used as a resource to help find offenders.

Plant Sale Recap

Rhonda Spence provided an update on the annual plant sale – which was a success (see 'Annual Plant Sale' article on page 8)! The proceeds from the sales on April 27th will be used in maintaining the six land-scape beds throughout the neighborhood. In addition, she shared an opportunity for anyone interested in having a raised garden bed of their own at the Saturn Road Church of Christ Community Garden for only \$10.00 a year.

District 5 Update

Councilman Rich Aubin gave his annual report on the state of our district and also passed out booklets with information on the specifics of the bond election.

LBJ/635 Improvement Project: The deadline for bids was April 29, 2019 and will follow with a month of review in order to award the final contract. It is estimated that the work will begin this summer and it will take four years for the completion of the project. With the improved freeway frontage access, economic development will be guaranteed.

Former Hypermart site: The property was purchased by the City of Garland and is being studied as to how it will be best developed with the additional access from LBJ/635.

Shiloh Road: Shiloh is being widened to six lanes from LBJ to Kingsley with plans to be extended further at a later date.

Skate Park: The skate park, which was part of the 2004 Bond Program, will now be located at Rick Oden Park. Over 90 citizens attended the planning meeting and agreed that it should be the largest in the area, over 40,000 square feet. This skate park is expected to be an economic boost to the surrounding area due to the large number of visitors expected.

Garland Police Department: There has been another Mental Health Officer added to the Garland Police Department. This is a continuing concern with the many needs of the homeless individuals that can be found along the Dallas and Garland borders at the Ferguson/Centerville & LBJ area.

District 5 Update Continued

Bond Changes & Projects: Facing the proposed change in revenue sources from the property tax overhaul by the State of Texas, the City of Garland is concerned. On Councilman Aubin's recommendation, John Willis was appointed to work on the Bond Committee. The \$1.2 billion recommended for projects was reduced to \$425 million with a focus on fast implementation.

Two projects that need immediate completion are the construction of a new Pet Shelter and a new, improved Police Department Property Room. Since the bond passed, property taxes will be raised 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ cents per \$100.00 of property evaluation. This increase will be an approximate additional assessment rate per month of \$3.00 for seniors and \$7.00 for all other property owners.

Drainage Projects: The drainage projects included in the bond are those streets surrounding and downhill to Saturn Springs that were not addressed in the Parkmont Bond Project as well as across the creek to Overhill and to the streets that intersect Overhill.

Flooding: The bond includes funding to buy some of the most flood prone properties along Glenbrook as the most financially feasible solution to the flooding experienced by many of those residents.

Rick Oden Park: The bond will also make major improvements at Rick Oden Park including a splash pad, improved and enlarged tennis center, walking trails, complete improvement of entry points and roadway throughout, and improved parking. The new park will improve economic development in the surrounding areas. Councilman Aubin also voiced that with the loss of a neighborhood library, locating a Library Kiosk at Rick Oden Park would be ideal as well as the benefits of having an area set aside for a food truck court in the park.

Get to Know Mayor Elect LeMay

Mayor Elect Scott Le May shared his background that brought him in service to the City of Garland. With his wife, Tippy, who is employed by Richardson ISD, they bought their first home on the Garland side of Jupiter Road eighteen years ago. After living in his new neighborhood for only two years, he responded to a flyer that was left on his door to attend the Camelot Neighborhood Association meeting. He quickly got to know many of his neighbors and after learning more about the needs of his neighborhood, he became active in the association. Eventually, he was elected to the board and then became president of the association. This involvement encouraged him to run for City Council in 2007, which was unsuccessful, but he was later appointed to the Planning Commission. This appointment opened his eyes to the needs of the whole of Garland. He served from 2007-2012 on the Planning Commission and then decided to resign to run again for City Council. He

was successful and has served since then until his decision to run for mayor this year. He voiced that his service has been a great experience and that he loves Garland, which is his forever home. Running unopposed for mayor, he never thought that service would be his life's ambition, but he is happily committed to that now. Mr. Le May set his to-do list as those eight proposals included on the bond which focus on the economic, philosophical, and political problems Garland faces which define the quality of life for its citizens. The bond addresses many needs that will help bring a new face to our city - prioritize, plan, and most importantly produce. Councilman Aubin said that Mayor Elect Le May will make a fabulous mayor. To ensure the success of the bond proposals, if passed, managers will be hired to focus full time on their completion.


