A few years back I posted a series of seven installments on Facebook that got a great reception from friends I grew up within the Orchard Hills part of town. As a kid, I spent a lot of time at Mr. Harris' Rexall, the Dairy Queen and Piggly Wiggly. We lived a stones throw from Orchard Hills Baptist in my childhood home on Beasley Drive.

My installments are centered around my Little League baseball memories in South Garland. All my teammates also grew up in/near Orchard Hills. My path from Little League in South Garland ultimately led me to graduating from GHS in '72 and then the U.S. Air Force Academy in '76, from which I ultimately went on to be a career fighter pilot in the Air Force. As my installments unfold, I definitely tie my childhood experiences, growing up in this neighborhood, to successes I achieved later in life.

Looking Back Continued...


Among my earliest recollections was a hill in my backyard in Texas. It wasn't an anthill or molehill. It was a pitcher's mound with a brick for a pitching rubber. Constructed diligently by my Dad that summer of '60 so our backyard baseball field would be more complete. That little elevated parcel of the yard didn't grow much grass that summer. We'd convene games on no particular schedule and pretend we were Mickey Mantle or Yogi Berra or Tony Kubek. We loved the Yankees for many reasons but mainly because they were always on TV and they always won. When the guys weren't around, I'd practice my delivery against the backyard porch and to my Mom's credit she rarely made me guit even though the sound of a 30 mph fastball banging off the back door was intrusive.

The biggest controversies that summer weren't over batting averages but who was responsible for all the broken windows, mainly those of the next door neighbors who didn't like baseball. It fell upon my Mom and Dad to be a screen for us. Our league continued unabated throughout the summer despite the protests from next door. I don't remember how I paid off my broken window indebtedness but somehow my parents devised a working agreement. I do remember walking over with my Mom or Dad on several occasions and standing with them while they explained that the window would be replaced. I didn't have any remorse except for putting my folks out.

Homes should never be built so close to baseball fields!

Hitting a home run back then was a big deal to a six year old. The parameters were narrow. The baseball had to clear the back_fence. The side fences didn't count. The trees were also a factor. The hackberry tree in left center robbed me of more home runs than Willie Mays could have. But the thrill of a dinger is timeless and ageless! Didn't matter whether you were dressed out in cut-offs and a T-shirt or, as in a year later, a "real" uniform of cut-off elasticized

blue jeans and a T-Shirt with a sponsor's name on it. We might as well have been in Yankee Stadium as the backyard of 2860 Beasley Drive. We just imagined the façade across the backyard fence.

That first summer of baseball awareness came even before thoughts of school since kindergarten wasn't invented yet and first grade was just a reality we faced the first week of September after our first season was over. Although I didn't discover it until 30 years later, Mickey Mantle cried more over the stunning loss of the '60 World Series at the hand of Bill Mazeroski and the black Pirates than I did on the first day of first grade. By the time of Maz's fateful 9th inning walk-off homerun, I was more worried about getting my mouth washed out with soap by my teacher Mrs. Cotton than I was about what had happened in the World Series in my distant corner of a six year old's universe.

How did Rick Oden Park get its name?

Rick Oden Park was once known as Cole Park, for developer M.C. Cole who gave the park to the city in 1955. It was renamed the following year as a dedication to a child who passed away in a fatal baseball accident.

Richard Roy "Rick" Oden, was an 11 year old boy who played on the West Garland Little League team. Rick's father, Jack Oden, was comanager of the team.

On June 29th of 1956, Rick was up to bat and was hit by the ball in the back of the head, which caused his death a few days later.

District 5 Update from Rich Aubin

Council gave preliminary approval in early February for a new sidewalk program has been in development in our Subcommittee on Transportation, Infrastructure, & Mobility. We had wanted to look at the program given the influx of available money for sidewalks from the 2019 Bond Program. The prior program was not well utilized, and I think everyone knows our sidewalks need some help, particularly in some of our economically disadvantaged neighborhoods.

In areas where we have -no- sidewalks, we will look at areas where there is a mobility need (a bus stop, park, school, a worn path, etc.) to target new sidewalk funds. For rebuilding sidewalks, we use a 50/50 program, splitting the cost between the owner and the City with the average cost of a total project being about \$2,200. The new program, which is not final, will change the split. 50/50 is the base, but if the home has a homestead exemption (i.e., not rented) the City takes on another 15%; located in an economically disadvantaged census tract (CDBG), then another 15%; and Senior/Disability exemption another 10%. That's a potential 90/10 split. You won't even need to ask or apply for the split - it all comes off of DCAD and your address.

This is a massive change in approach and a major step towards recognizing sidewalks as an important component of our transportation and mobility network in Garland. This program will be of enormous benefit to the neighborhoods of District Five. One last adjustment will aim to encourage neighbors to band together to get long stretches of sidewalks fixed. We expect a large uptick in demand and we will be ready and funded to do ten times the number of sidewalks that we have done over the last few years.
