## **Annual Meeting and Crime Watch Review**

The annual meeting of the Orchard Hills Neighborhood Association was held on the evening of April 18, 2024 at the Saturn Road Church of Christ, 3030 Saturn Road, Garland, TX. Twenty-four residents and guests enjoyed homemade cookies as they mingled before the meeting. Margi Bice, Co-Chair, began the meeting with a prayer. Secretary Cathy Stark led the Pledge of Allegiance. Rhonda Spence, Treasurer, reported a bank balance of \$4,614.35. Many members took the opportunity to renew their OHNA membership at the meeting. Cathy Stark presented the minutes from last year's annual meeting, which were approved. Donna Fielding, Board Member at Large, led a mixer activity in which participants shared favorite cleaning tips. Magic Eraser, white vinegar, and baking soda were all staples in many homes, but I bet most people don't know that Coke does an excellent job cleaning grimy outside windows! Just be sure to rinse well. Jim Neargarder produced a wonderful slide show of OHNA through the years. You may view the photos at ohna.us. It was fun going down memory lane yet sobering to see how many active association members are no longer with us.

Mayor Scott LeMay kicked off the program with a review of what was accomplished in Garland this past year and what exciting things are upcoming. The 2019 bond package has financed many projects throughout Garland, including renovated parks and Fire Station No. 6. The Holford Park renovation is expected to be finished by early 2026. It will include a lazy river. The Central Library has been completely gutted and will open mid-2026. Downtown Garland Square is now complete from its renovation project. The Bob Day Tennis Complex at Tuckerville Park will open in 2026. Mayor LeMay encouraged everyone to vote on Election Day, May 4th. Surprisingly only 3-4% of Garland citizens vote. He also told us he is starting his last year as Mayor of Garland, as his term will max out in May 2025.

Michelle Stuyvesant, from the sanitation department, gave a presentation on where all our trash goes, how it is processed, what items can and cannot be recycled, and how we can reduce the amount of trash that goes into Garland's landfill. Many of the answers to our questions could be found in the Waste Wizard link at the City of Garland's Sanitation web page. You can type in any item, and it will tell you how to properly dispose of it. Not sure what you can put in the blue recycle bin? Ask the Waste Wizard! For example, here's how to dispose of an old smoke detector: "Remove batteries before placing smoke detector in the trash. Batteries may be taken to the Dallas County Home Chemical Collection Center." Also, mark your calendar for the next free shredding event, October 26th from 9:00 a.m. - noon at 1426 Commerce Street.

Garland Police Officer Nicholas Sherry, who is assigned to our neighborhood, was introduced by Jimmy Hooten, the leader of our neighborhood crime watch. Officer Sherry reported that our neighborhood has one of the lowest incidents of crime in the city. However we should still lock our car doors, keep our garage doors closed, and call 911 if you see anything that looks out of place (ex. person or vehicle). Officer Sherry reminded us that we are the eyes and ears of our neighborhood. Watch for Amazon packages left on your porch; they are being stolen. If you hear gunshots, call the police. There is more police presence at the skatepark on the weekends. Also, call the police if you see large gatherings of cars, as they could be assembling for street races. The Garland Police Department offers courses for residents. The Citizens' Police Academy, a 13-week class, is offered each spring. The Citizens' Fire Academy is offered in the fall. Also, the one-day, 4-hour Citizens On Patrol (C.O.P.) class is currently accepting enrollment. ## Annual Meeting and Crime Watch Review-continued

Our City Councilwoman, Margaret Lucht, gave a report on District 5. The road construction at Glenbrook and Miller is scheduled for completion by June 2025. We will have left turn lanes to alleviate the traffic at that busy intersection. The LBJ highway expansion is still on schedule and set to be done December 2025. Another major project coming to Orchard Hills is the Saturn Springs Drainage Project. This will impact the streets within Overhill to Glenbrook to Briarwood to Saturn as well as Saturn Springs to Glenbrook, Locke to Carney to Saturn and possibly Kynn, Dale and Charles. The design phase is 60% complete now. After bids are received, the anticipated start time is fall of 2025. The multi-million dollar street project will replace our outdated sewer lines, improve the underground drainage system to alleviate flooding in our streets and yards, and replace asphalt surfaces with paved streets. Sidewalks will also be renewed or added where there are none. A special meeting was held on April 30, 2024 to cover this drainage project in depth.

Prizes were awarded to the newest Orchard Hills resident, Jaric Jones, and the longest-term resident, Jimmy Hooten. Everyone in attendance won a door prize. Our generous prize donors were: the new Olive Garden at 13771 LBJ Frwy; Piefalootin' at 2441 Goldfinch, Garland; Honey from BeeGirl.Biz; and City of Garland's Office of Neighborhood Vitality.

OHNA has plans for a full year ahead with flags displayed three times a year, neighborhood garden work days each month, a garage sale in September, and a block party & food drive in December. And if all this isn't enough, we have a new walking group that formed at the annual meeting. People making connections and sharing interests! 
We saw turtles, minnows, and a baby copperhead! No one got hurt except for a skinned knee.

Betty Lou Templer Roberts passed away on Sunday, May 5, 2024 at the age of 86. Betty was born to Cloma and N.I. Templer on May 27, 1937, in Merkel, Texas. She grew up on a farm in Rotan, Texas and graduated from Abilene Christian College (ACC) in 1959. Betty met her future husband Gerow Roberts while in the band at ACC. They married on January 23, 1959.

Betty moved to Garland in 1966 with her husband, Gerow and their four children. She taught English at South Garland High School for about 20 years and was the head of the English department. After she retired from public school teaching, she taught in the Dallas County Community College District for another 20 years.

Betty and Gerow own a 160 acre farm in Bowie, Texas where they loved to spend their free time. Since the passing of her husband, Betty continued to go there and feel closer to him and enjoy the outdoors.

Betty Roberts was predeceased in death by her husband of 59 years, Gerow Roberts and her grandson, Zachary Roberts.
